The Moores of Glasnevin: The Irish Rhododendron Story



Dr. David Moore and his son Sir Frederick Moore were the greatest Directors of the Royal (now National) Botanic Gardens, Glasnevin in Dublin, between them the managed the gardens from 1838 to 1922, by which time the only botanic gardens that could match it for botanical and horticultural excellence were its sister gardens at Kew and Edinburgh.

From its earliest years Glasnevin was

involved in the introduction of *Rhododendron* species to British, Irish, and European gardens, introducing *Rhododendron arboreum* subsp. *zeylanicum* to cultivation in 1836 and continuing the process further through the collections of the Great Plant Hunters like E. H. Wilson, Joseph Rock, George Forrest, Captain Frank Kingdon Ward, and those of Lady Charlotte Wheeler Cuffe from Mount Victoria in the Chin Hills of Myanmar (Burma).

Yakushima

Atsuko visited Yakushima, home to *Rhododendron degronianum* ssp. *yakushimanum* or "yaks", in the spring of 2024. All-day trekking was rewarded by the yaks in full bloom at 6,000 feet. The transition of *R. degronianum* with elevation gain from *v. intermedium* to ssp. *yakushimanum* was clearly seen. She will introduce you to the beauty of Yakushima and its majestic nature through a photographic tour.

Travels in Yunnan: Frank Kingdon Ward Territory



A mid-summer Expedition to Yunnan

Yunnan province in western China is home to half of all China's plant and animal species and 25 distinct ethnic groups. This lecture is based on an 18 day visit in June-July 2024 – peak flowering season during the height of the Indian monsoon – retracing routes taken by Captain Frank Kingdon Ward in 1911 and 1913.

From the ancient city of Lijiang the lecture recounts visits to the Tibetan frontier region to see sacred peaks painted by the blossoms of rhododendrons and blue poppies, lakes fringed by meadows full of candelabra primulas and glades of giant Himalayan lilies beneath a diverse canopy of ancient trees.

Grafting Workshop

In this hands-on workshop, you'll gain practical experience in the art of rhododendron grafting. We'll cover a variety of grafting techniques, essential tools, suitable rootstocks, and the optimal timing for successful grafts. All necessary materials will be provided for you. Participants are welcome to bring their own scion; just be sure to store it in a sealed plastic bag and keep it refrigerated until the workshop.

This class is limited to 10 participants.

New Plantings Garden Tour

Gardens are ever-evolving, and while we work to maintain our established collection of species rhododendrons at the RSBG, change is always a part of the process. This tour will highlight areas we've created or rehabilitated in recent years to enhance and expand our collection of species rhododendrons and woodland companion plants. We'll explore new species, revisit old favorites we're aiming to improve, and delve into the thought process behind these exciting projects.

Fern Collection and Stumpery Tour

Take an in-depth tour of fern species at the RSBG, including a walk through the world's largest public stumpery. The intentional arrangement of woody material like stumps, old logs, and twisted root masses creates exceptional habitat for ferns and other shade-loving plants.

Follow-Up Tour

A tour of subsection Fortunea including several of the newer species in cultivation. This will be a "hands on" follow-up of Steve's morning lecture.

Keynote Speaker

Seamus O'Brien



Seamus O'Brien is head gardener at the National Botanic Gardens, Kilmacurragh, Co. Wicklow, the country estate and rural annex of the National Botanic Gardens, Glasnevin in Dublin. He received his formal horticultural training at Glasnevin and also holds an International Diploma in Botanic Gardens Management from the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew.

In the past, he has been head gardener of several notable Irish gardens with historic plant collections, including Glanleam on Valentia Island, Co. Kerry famed for its southern hemisphere trees and shrubs, and Beech Park in Clonsilla, then renowned for one of the largest collections of herbaceous and alpine plants in Britain and Ireland. He returned to Glasnevin as

a staff member in February 2000 and from there moved to manage the gardens at Kilmacurragh in May 2006.

He has traveled extensively across the globe to study plants in their native habitats, most notably to China, Nepal, Tibet, California, Bhutan, Myanmar, Chile, Australia, Tasmania, New Zealand, and, in more recent times to India, including successive trips to the Sikkim Himalaya. From these expeditions he has published two award winning books; *In the Footsteps of Augustine Henry and his Chinese Collectors* (2011), and, *In the Footsteps of Joseph Dalton Hooker: A Sikkim Adventure* (2018). He also contributes to several publications including Curtis's Botanical Magazine, The Irish Garden, the Irish Garden Plant Society newsletter and the International Dendrology Society Year Book.

He lectures on garden history and botanical travel internationally and is a member of the Royal Horticultural Society's Woody Plant Committee and is a judge of the RHS Early Spring Shows. Rhododendrons are a passion and he is Irish Branch Chairman of the Royal Horticultural Society's Rhododendron Camellia and Magnolia Group and a trustee of Exbury Gardens in England.

In 2018, Seamus was awarded the Royal Horticultural Society of Ireland's Gold Medal of Honour, in 2021 he was made a Fellow of the Explorer's Club (New York), in 2022 he was awarded the Royal Horticultural Society's (UK) Loder Rhododendron Cup and in 2023 was made a Fellow of the Linnean Society.

Steve Hootman

Steve Hootman is the executive director of horticulture and curator of the RSBG. He has worked at the RSBG since 1992 and has participated in or led at least 30 expeditions into the world's remote regions looking for rare and new taxa of rhododendrons and other plants. Steve is considered one of the world authorities on the genus *Rhododendron* and woodland gardening and has introduced dozens of rhododendrons and other ornamental plants into cultivation.



Atsuko Gibson

Atsuko is the nursery manager and assistant curator at the RSBG. Originally from Japan, she holds a degree in horticulture from the University of Arkansas and gained valuable experience as an intern at the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh. Specializing in the propagation of species rhododendrons through seeds, cuttings, and grafting, Atsuko oversees the management of the RSBG's two-acre nursery, where she combines her expertise and passion for plant cultivation.



Emily Joseph

Emily Joseph is the assistant nursery manager and retail sales manager at the RSBG, as well as the nursery and sales manager for the Hardy Fern Foundation. A Washington state Certified Professional Horticulturist, she holds degrees in Environmental Horticulture and Fine Art. As a visual artist, Emily enjoys photographing plants and gardens, incorporating botanical illustration into her painting, printmaking, and design work.



Will Clausen

Will is the RSBG's horticulturist and assistant curator. He has worked as a field botanist, habitat conservationist, and horticulturist across the northern part of the United States. Outside work, he enjoys photographing and writing about wild plants and backpacking to see them in their natural settings.
